Stratton's Independence Mine & Mill was situate near Victor, Colorado, on the south slope of Battle Mountain. Mining in the Cripple Creek District began in 1891. Soon after, miners and the companies they worked for had violent encounters over pay and conditions, leading in 1893 to formation of the Western Federation of Miners, referred to in this document. Tensions between

management and workers escalated to the Colorado Labor Wars of 1903. Matters were never settled, and associations such as the Miners' Protective came and went. Here we see evidence of a Swedish immigrant in the last year of his teens, working as a trammer, loading broken rock on tramcars and delivering it at the shaft. (#039756) \$75.00

In 1867, he was appointed Secretary for Montana Territory, and served as Montana's acting governor in 1868-1869.
